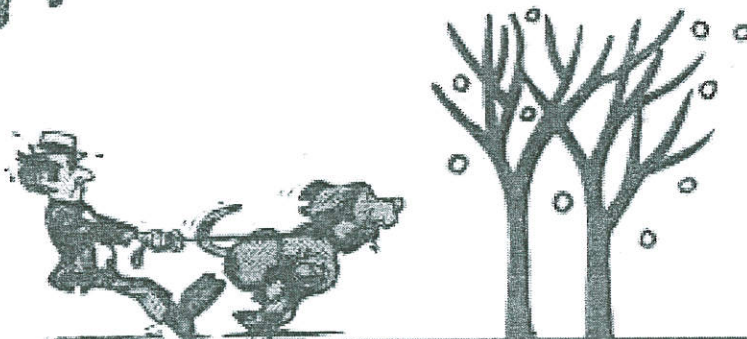

So...Saturday morning rolls around. I drove into Truckee late Friday, and only got five hours sleep and rather would stay in bed. Still, it's time to run the dogs, and I have a new sled with which to do it.

Everything I read says there is plenty of snow to run a sled in Tahoe meadows but nowhere else....it's Saturday, and the snowline hasn't dropped below 6,000' yet. It's off to Tahoe Meadows. I get to Tahoe Meadows, and there is plenty of snow there. Unfortunately, none of it is tracked. It used to be that snowmobiles were allowed to run on the south side of the highway (I ran on snowmobile tracks there in Spring of 2,001)....not any more....I'm not sure if this closure is just until there's enough snow to protect the meadows, or if it's for the entire season....I'm sure I'll find out as the season progresses. For now, the area is still probably good for skijoring, but not for sledding....

I have directions to a spot near Prosser Dam where I can run the dogs, and I go there. The directions are good...I know I find the right spot by the little pieces of straw I find laying around. I run pairs off of my bike. The trail is muddy, but at least this mud doesn't stick to tires. There are light hills on this run....first time this season. The boys do particularly well. The girls do okay. That afternoon I head off to Royal Gorge for X-C Skiing. It's miserable. I find myself wading through multiple creeks while following trails that are nominally groomed and open. The storm starts to blow in, and I'm happy the clothing I have on insulates well when wet....except the cotton briefs....cold. I'm also happy I am in shape enough to keep moving. I get back to the truck at sunset....I'm not that cold.

The hope remains to try out the new sled on Sunday.... the snowline is supposed to drop below 5,000' Saturday night. The hope is that plenty of snow falls on the Webber Lake road, and that with a sufficiently late start, at least a snowmobiler or two will pack the trail well enough to sled on.

I spend the night at a motel in Truckee. The hot shower feels good after the skiing. It does snow hard Saturday night. Power at the motel goes out during the night and is intermittent till morning (I am happy I brought a down bag and a headlamp.....). Satellite TV is not intermittent; it's out all night...no ESPN, even when there is power.

Sunday morning, snow is intermittent..just some flurries. I get to the Webber Lake parking lot at about 10:45. Definitely late..but..the parking lot still has not been plowed. Fortunately, there are enough places where the snow isn't overwhelming and I am able to drive around pretty easily. And snowmobilers have packed the trail....I am happy. It's as I'm laying out my lines that the groomer comes bouncing down the road. I'm very happy.

My first run with my new sled is great. A couple of snowmobiles pass, but everybody is polite and passes carefully. The dogs are slow. Still, they are all pulling...and when they catch their wind, they break into a run. I may be wrong, but I figure I can set the training up around that.... They'll do fine come the first races. The snow is well packed, though a little slow...there are legitimate reasons for the dogs to be running slow. Fresh snow is everywhere...and it's quiet....a winter day in the mountains. The sled and team have a good first day on snow. My final runs of the day are my own at Royal Gorge. This time, there are no exposed streams. ...the trails are great, and I fly.

an opportunity to almost catch him before he hops some more and takes off again. We keep this up for several minutes. All the other dogs get excited and want to join in, but Khookhaa isn't interested. He has challenged just me. Eventually, after he has demonstrated that I am not likely to catch him, he eats the cardboard and goes off to take a nap, lying upside down beside the couch in complete abandon. He knows he is the man and can do whatever he wants. If I try to scold him, he just looks at me with his big brown eyes and his heart shaped face and I can't get mad. There is just something about these guys.

The third case (I know I only quoted two originally, but too bad) is my female Mal. She thinks she is a cat. She is about the same weight as Khookhaa but is actually taller. Yet when she wants some loving she tries to wind herself around your legs like cats do. It works better when the cats do it, though, because they don't knock you over. Then she puts her head down to the floor and leans on your legs, with her rear end up. Slowly she just collapses on top of you. Life would sure be dull without those Malamutes!

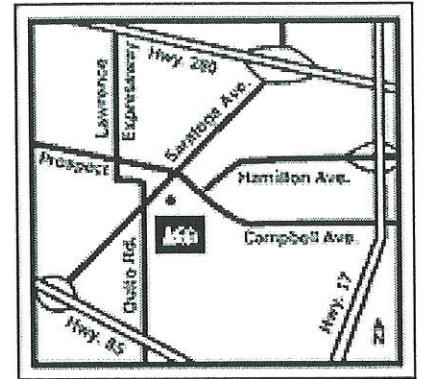

### Best Snowshoe Routes of Northern California:

7 pm, Tuesday, January 7

Northern California snowshoe country has it all—aspens-lined meadows, majestic groves of Jeffrey pines, panoramic ridge tops and more... Tonight Marc Soares, author of *Snowshoe Routes in Northern California* (The Mountaineers Books), will share slides and information on some of his top picks for snowshoe destinations in the northern part of our state. You'll find out best places to go in the Yosemite Valley area, along the Eastern Sierra from Tioga Pass to Sonora Pass, around Carson Pass and the Lake Tahoe Basin, and up north in the Lassen and Shasta regions. Whether you're interested in a half-day outing or a daylong adventure, come learn about gear essential for snow travel and how to evaluate safe weather and snow conditions.

### Winter Backcountry Travel: Safety and Survival Tips:

7 pm, Tuesday, January 14

How do you get ready for a day out in the snow—by stuffing a jacket and water bottle into your pack as you head out the door? If so, you may be putting your own life—and the lives of others—in unnecessary danger. Tonight Robert Parkhurst, mountaineering instructor and member of the Pinecrest Nordic Ski Patrol, will teach you how to best prepare for the potential hazards of winter backcountry travel, as he shares the latest information on accident prevention techniques, rescue fundamentals and survival basics. Whether you're headed out on snowshoes, skis or snowboard, for the day or an overnight, come learn about the gear, skills and knowledge that are essential for safe winter travel.

### Alaska's Gates of the Arctic National Park: A Winter Mushing Adventure:

7 pm, Tuesday, January 21

Last March mountaineer Masa Maeda set out on his first expedition by dog sled: a two-week exploration of the Arrigetch Peaks in the Brooks Range, organized by Sourdough Outfitters in Bettles, Alaska. Join Masa for slides and stories of his 270-mile mushing adventure navigating nearly impassable sections of the Nahtuk and Iniakuk Rivers and climbing 20-degree slopes in this remote and beautiful section of Gates of the Arctic National Park. Masa will discuss what he learned about mental and physical endurance training, winter survival and safety skills, and the remarkable relationships that develop between dogs and humans working as a team.

The following dogs are available to approved working/pet homes. These dogs have been running/training on the main team and would like to see them continue to run.



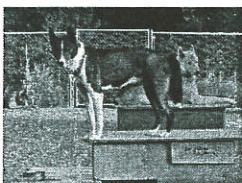

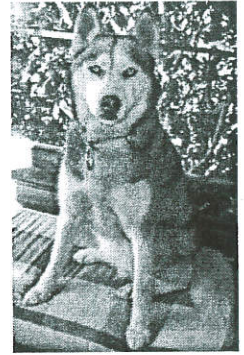
