## More on M. Buser and Dr. Townshend By Marie Stevens

I know there has already been an article in the newsletter on the presentations given by Martin Buser and Dr. Townshend in Sacramento, but I wanted to add some personal observations. They really were very interesting to listen to....witty and full of unusual tid bits. Dr. Townshend shared the great way they have found to get urine samples for the drug testing (at least for the boys)....they fasten a baggy around the hind tummy area (delicately put, don't you think?) and then lead to dog over to a competitor's sled. Of course, the first thing the dog does is lift his leg and pee. If there is no sled around, they use somebody else's truck. I'm going to have to remember that when I'm taking my dogs for a walk, trying to get them to pee. I'll look for Hugo's sled or truck. (Well, after all, his dog peed on my leg at the ice cream social!!) He also mentioned some of the veterinarians who have "gone over to the dark side".....i.e., they have started running IN the race, not just helping with dog care. He said that about 1/3 of the dogs dropped during the race are dropped due to wrist and shoulder injuries. There weren't as many injuries of this type this year because there was less snow, and going over those hummocks of grass slowed the teams down enough to make this less common. He also talked about how he got into working as a vet for the Iditarod. He read an article about the death of one of Martin Buser's dogs in the race, and saw how upset Martin was about it. So he sent him a note, and Martin answered. A seemingly small thing to make such a change in a person's life!

Mr. Buser told a lot of personal anecdotes about the race. He clearly has a good time while out there. He talked about playing a trick on another musher once, convincing the guy that he had gotten turned around and was going the wrong direction. The other musher actually turned around and headed back in the direction from which he had just come, thinking he was getting back on the trail. When he got **Cont on Page 3**



He likes to go on "free runs", where he turns about 20-25 dogs loose and then takes off on an ATV. The dogs loved it – they raced along beside him just as happy as could be. I can't quite see doing that around here, but I guess if you are far enough out in the country it could work. Sure looked like fun. Another one of my favorite scenes in his video was of his puppies running in the giant "hamster cages". They could jump out whenever they wanted, and they were really going to town, little tails wagging in the air. It was really cute. Mr. Buser really surprised me when he said he is getting away from feeding his dogs raw meat. He used mostly kibble last year, and is going to completely do away with raw meat this year. It'll be interesting to see if this becomes a trend with other mushers.

Both of these guys were very friendly and glad to answer questions. It was a really great evening. I want to add my thanks to SNDD, too, for setting this event up.

A Few Comments on the Start of Mushing Season with No Particular Meaning

Mushing season has officially started. At least training has, and not casual runs either. It's too early in the season to really push, but the stopwatches and odometers are in full use. I'm tracking every run for speed and taking notes as to what and how each dog is doing. And for the record, I am now training four dogs. Of course I have my two, Dawn, a.k.a. Cuddles the Pig and Tenaya, a.k.a. Tenaya the Teenage Werewolf. In addition to that I have Goober, a.k.a. the Uber Goober and Dash, a.k.a. Benny the Jet.

Goob and Dash are from Nic. I'm borrowing them for training on weekends and eventually for races. This is working out great! Nic and Diane have made it easy for me to pick up and drop off the boys...Goob and Dash that is..... Thank you!

At this point, I should apologize to Niko the Worm and BoBo the Clown (two other of Nic's dogs) for going with Goob and Dash. Sorry guys...but Niko, I can't keep you in my back yard without tying you down and Boris, you hardly pulled for me at all last season (though you were great fun to watch as you rolled in the snow). Anyway, sorry boys...but if it's any consolation, you all know I'm a sucker to scratch you any time you see me.....

Training four dogs....well....most of my training runs have been on my bike running two dogs at a time. I'm starting to get into a routine with this....getting pretty efficient about moving one pair in and another out. Generally, I've been running the girls (both show stock) as one pair, and the boys (both racing stock) as the other pair. It's interesting to see what differences there are....the most notable is how much faster Goob and Dash can trot compared to Dawn and Tenaya....it's almost two miles per hour, or about twenty percent.

In addition to the runs on the bike, I've also done a couple of runs on a cart with the team. Each of these runs had the added pleasure of being in the mountains in the Truckee area. The last cart run went particularly well. Not very fast, but strong the whole way with everybody pulling well....even had a hill en-route. I'm happy.

In other news, I am planning on purchasing my first sled. That has me kind of stoked. I've checked with a couple of people who have built sleds (Nic Matulich and Don Cadwell), and got a few more details about what to look for. Anyway, the sled should be ordered by the time this article is published.

The game plan is to do most of the fall training in pairs using my bike. However, once there's snow in the mountains...and not necessarily a lot of snow....I'll be working the dogs as a team using the sled. Those few runs I've done with the foursome pulling a cart have me encouraged that this will be a good team, at least for a duffer like me and a quartet of Sibes.

Finally, one new thing I've learned about myself is I am lousy at recognizing dog faces....at least if I haven't seen them for a while. Even now, I can correctly ID only about half of Nic's dogs....probably less. Once I ID them, I know their personalities and remember who they are and what to expect from them (or more importantly what they expect from me), but recognizing faces seems to elude me. At least I can recognize Goob and Dash..... and I have found that a bribe of food or a good scratching will quickly get a dog to forget that you misidentified him as one of his packmates.....that would be in perfect agreement with what Mark Twain said about the difference between a dog and a man.....wouldn't it?

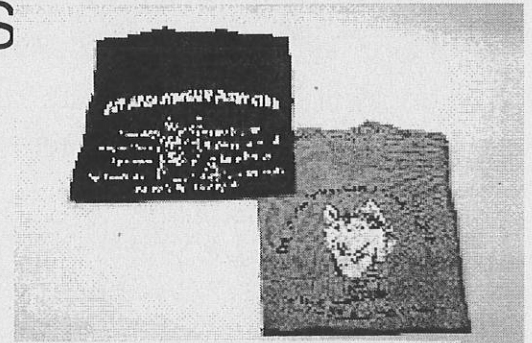

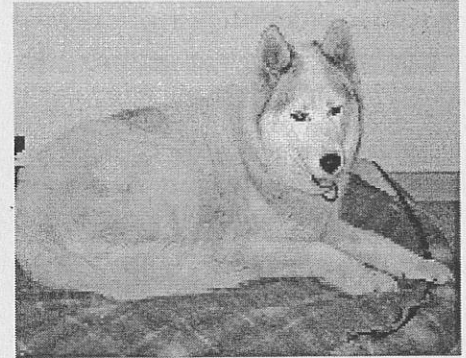

## Tsavo – From Mangy to Marvelous

Tsavo was adopted by Debbie and Herb Newsam

Tsavo was rescued from a puppy mill in South Dakota by AMAL on 9/20/00. He was in the poorest health of the 9 Malamutes rescued. They called him "Mangy Dog". He almost didn't make it though. They had difficulty getting the health certificate signed. When it was signed, it was called his second chance at life. They thought he was 9 years old. It was later felt that Tsavo was only 2 years old when rescued. Nic Matulich agreed to foster him. AMAL shipped him out to Nic on Nov. 20, 2000. Over time, Tsavo would make some progress and then would regress....he never got well. In January of 2002, Nic asked the Sapiros to work with him. They wanted to work with him, but one of their dogs wasn't happy with him, so Randee McQueen offered to foster him. At the end of January, Tsavo hit an all-time low and lost 98% of his fur. He was bald. If someone accidentally hit his foot, he would bleed. That was the turning point for him though. He made 10 steps forward and only 2 back. He was bathed and dipped once a week for 5 months. During this time his personality developed into a new, wonderful dog. He put up with so much that all of life was and is good to him. On Sept 7th, Tsavo was taken to the Campbell Adoption Fair for a trial run. Debbie had gone with the intention of looking at a young Mal but to her surprise discovered Tsavo there. Debbie and Herb had inquired about adopting Tsavo the year before but Nic said he wasn't ready for adoption. Debbie fell in love. She heard all that still needed to be done with him, and still wanted him. He went home with her and knew from the start it was his forever home. He came back to Randee after a week since Debbie and Herb were going out of town for two weeks. When they returned to get him, he was so happy to see them. He let everyone know that Debbie and Herb are his forever parents.

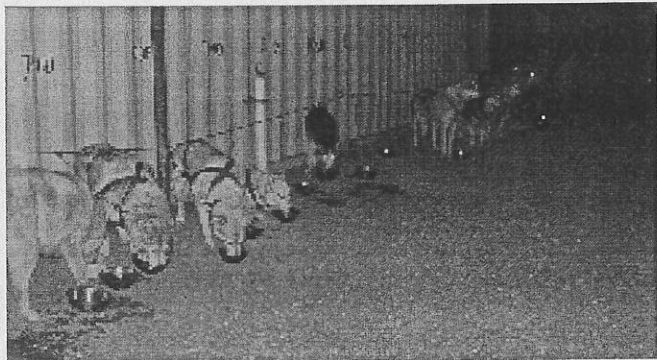


## ---A Little Slice of Heaven on Earth- Mt. Umunhum

Starry, starry night...we gathered one late, chilly Saturday afternoon in October, approximately 20 of us, on Mt. Umunhum, most of us with expectations of spending the night out under the stars. Before dark descended, the group enjoyed quiet conversation and a wonderful tri-tip dinner. Early evening brought weather that chilled to the bone but allowed the dogs to cart quite easily. Three teams set out under a full moon and ran past the yellow gate. We contemplated a second run but decided against it as a heavy fog was rolling in around Mt. Umunhum. The weather appeared to warm just a bit as this fog thickened. For those who needed to climb to the very top of the mountain to use the restroom, serenity set in as we appeared to be alone on our very own island, high above the clouds. Along the Santa Cruz coastline, a thick white blanket of fog drifted in toward Umunhum, obscuring all remnants of civilization. 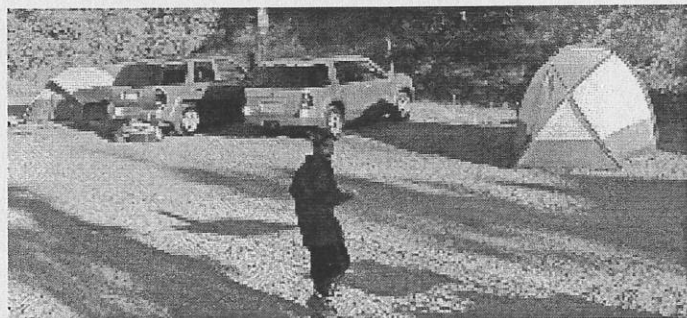
