Rosie's great escape!

We went camping this past weekend, and this is our story:



The first picture was taken right before the great escape. The sun had just risen, I was walking up a hill for our morning nature walk and I decided to take a picture. I thought I had Rosie's leash securely in my hand, but alas I didn't. Something caught her eye and she took off up the hill! I called but she didn't turn around or look at me. So I "ran" after her, not an easy task as I quickly found out that running uphill is not my forte. I

managed to close the gap since she was probably doing the run and sniff. I called out to her; again she didn't turn around and instead turned left and took off running down a steep hill shown in the 2nd picture. I froze; my heart literally sank when she did that. I could feel my heart beat harder, eyes tearing up as real panic was beginning to set in. I stood there for a moment, then pushed away all my myriad emotions and told myself that we have enough recall training ... I just need to make eye contact with her. She had gone off trail to an area where yesterday I was shown game camera footage of mountain lions and wild boars. I was worried that she would get hurt running downhill or encountering dangerous animals. I knew our gap had widened by then but I still wanted her and any surrounding wildlife, to hear me so I kept talking loudly. I had a feeling that she would stay within ear shot. Finally, after scaling downhill and running through game trails, I hit flat land in a shaded area. I was out of breath and physically couldn't go on much further, especially with my bad knees. I had been running, jogging and fast walking for 20-30 minutes on varied terrains and grades. Pushing through muscle fatigue and knee pain all the while worrying that she had gone too far, I finally saw her bushy tail swishing amongst some bushes. I calmed myself down, crouched down and called to her loudly in the happiest voice I could muster. She stopped, turned and we made eye contact. I then immediately used a hand signal and voice command like how we've practiced at countless training sessions. She came running towards me! Just like in all our training sessions. The feeling of relief when I held her leash firmly in my hands is indescribable. If while running towards me (about 50 yards away) had

seen a rabbit, squirrel, etc. I would have been screwed. It wasn't until I had her on leash that I knew it was over. I hugged and praised her, telling her what a good girl she was and walked her towards where she had come. I didn't want to turn right around and head back because I want her to know that coming back to me doesn't mean fun time is over. She was just happily walking alongside me completely oblivious to what had transpired only minutes before.

Lessons learned: 1) Ensure you still have control of the leash when taking pictures and practice recall using voice only commands. I know Rosie can hear me but I don't think her ESL comprehension is very good. I recently read an Ian Dunbar article about how a lot of dogs don't understand the meaning of the command. To test that, you should turn your back to the dog and say the command. If the dog truly understands the command, then the dog should obey. If not, then the dog only understands the command in conjunction with some visual component (whether you were aware of it or not). I recently tested this with Rosie and sure enough she doesn't understand pure verbal commands. 2) If you hike regularly or even occasionally with your dog(s), I cannot emphasize how important regular recall training is. Even 5 minutes a day can make a difference, had I not put in the work, Rosie would not have come back. From now on I will not grunt and moan when I have to do training. If I do, I'll be sure to remind myself what happened that day.

P.S: I took the 2nd picture on the way back after I got Rosie. I did NOT stop mid chase to take a picture J

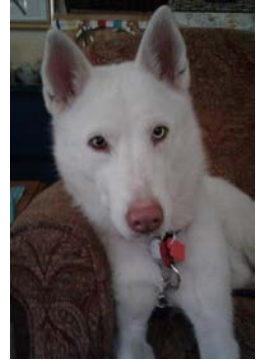

Bianca is a lovely 4 year old female. She walks well on a leash, knows basic commands and is housetrained. Bianca enjoys long walks and might possibly like running on leash alongside her human. She is friendly with other (medium to large) dogs and really enjoys running and playing. She might like to have another husky for a companion. However, she would not do well with smaller animals due to has strong prey drive.



Pumpkin Pie Dog Biscuits

Ingredients:

- 1 1/2 cups whole wheat flour
- 1 cup rolled oats
- 2 tsp. baking powder
- 1 tsp. cinnamon
- 1 tsp. ginger
- 1 tsp. allspice
- 2 tbsp. canola oil
- 1/2 cup pure pumpkin (not pumpkin pie filling)
- 1/4 cup natural peanut butter, smooth
- 1/4 cup water



Additional Flour for Rolling

Instructions:

1. Preheat oven to 325° F
2. In a large bowl, whisk together the flour, oats, baking powder, cinnamon, ginger, and allspice.
3. In a medium bowl, stir the canola oil, pumpkin, and peanut butter.
4. Make a well in the flour and pour in the pumpkin mixture.
5. Using a stand mixer, begin to combine the wet and dry ingredients on low.
6. Pour in the water and mix on low, to medium low, until thoroughly combined.
7. Turn the dough onto a floured surface, and hand knead the dough until no longer sticky.
8. Roll out to 1/4 inch thickness and cut into shapes with your favorite dog cookie cutters.
9. Spray a baking sheet with baking spray.
10. Place the cookies on the baking sheet and bake for 12 minutes.
11. Turn the oven off and leave in for another 30 minutes.
12. Cool completely on a wire rack before serving.

Storing - This recipe, as well as other recipes for pet treats, can be stored for later enjoyment. Since they are baked quite hard, you can keep tight container for approximately 2 weeks. If you bake a softer pumpkin pie biscuit, you can store them in the refrigerator for 4 weeks, and in months.

Yield - You will get around 100 cookies using a small 1 inch cookie cutter. You most likely will get two baking sheets full of cookies, no matter what cookie cutter you use.
