## BASH Product Review



### High Tech Lighting For the Trail

My Family and I recently tested the new three-LED PHL headlamp as well as the seven-LED CCE handheld flashlight from C. Crane Company on our canoe trip to Boundary Waters. I am delighted to report the results were excellent.

The Petzl based headlamp was used for canoeing at night as well as around camp and it was great! This

headlamp would be more than enough for mushing an 8-10 dog team, maybe more.

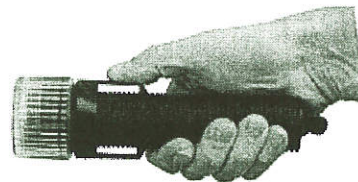
The hand held CCE lit up a broader area using 3 C-cells and was used around camp for general tasks and lighting. It projected a veritable floodlight of illumination on moonless nights. The military is now using a variation of this handheld flashlight.

These units use a new type of high-intensity LED bulb developed in the last few years. The bulb has a 100k hours life rating. The light has a bit of a blueish tint to it but depth perception is good and the illumination is broad. Last year we obtained a couple of the AA two-LED handhelds and found them more than adequate around camp so we were anxious to try the new products out this year.

We used both all week every night without a battery change and they remained at full brightness. Battery life at full brightness for the PHL headlamp is rated 50 hours and the CCE handheld is rated 40 hours with usable light extending to about 100 hours before requiring a battery change. Both units are very rugged and built for hard use.

The PHL ([http://www.ccrane.com/petzl\\_headlamp.asp](http://www.ccrane.com/petzl_headlamp.asp)) comes with TWO standard bulbs as well as the LED

module for \$39.95. One of the spare bulbs is stored behind the lamp housing.



The CCE (<http://www.ccrane.com/ccexpedition.asp>) is \$59.95 WITH batteries.

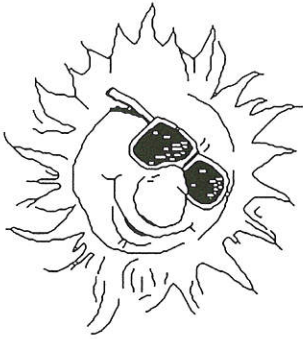
Please do not let the passing of this, or any other life, go with out taking a moment to reflect and take inventory of those things that truly make your life worth living.

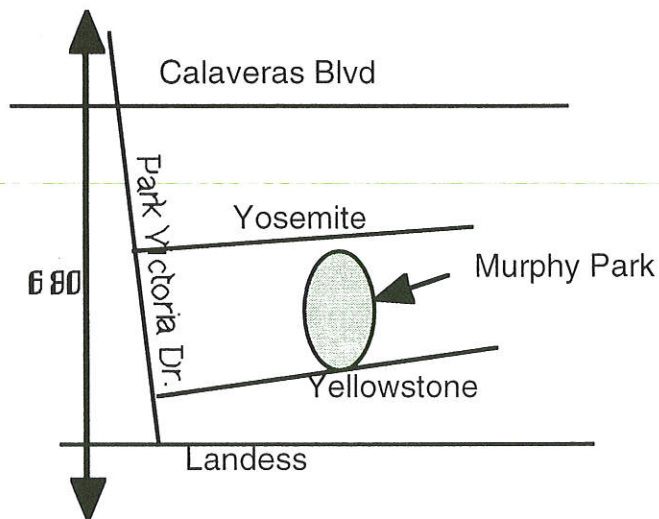

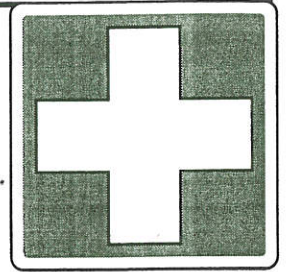

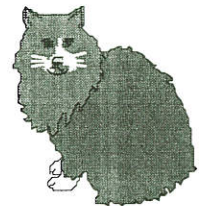

was a baby). Well, we discovered my beautiful Sam had an enlarged heart after one of his vet visits, so my husband and I went through all of the agonizing tests, cardiologists, etc. etc. etc. He was given about 6 months to live and we were ---devastated. We cried every time we saw his beautiful face and could not believe this could happen to him. Well, after numerous months, he went into heart failure and we had to put him to sleep. He died in my arms and I thought I would never be the same. I believe that this was the hardest thing I ever had to do. I couldn't even think of obtaining another dog for several months, but Goldie seemed to be so lonely. We had heard of another doggie through a friend and I went up with my girlfriend to meet this fellow with Goldie. Oh my, another hyper dog, I don't think so. I told the nice people, no thanks, sure don't need another hyper dog. You know, it just wasn't love at first sight. On the way home, I asked my friend Muriel for some unknown reason, hey, let's stop at San Martin and check out the dog pound after we take Goldie home (100 degrees outside).

I truly believe that Muriel is an angel anyway and she said, well, I think I can handle it. You know, every time that I go by that Pound, I cry, feeling so sad that all those poor little animals are in there. I wish I had the capability of rescuing all of them but just don't have the room for 100 dogs and cats. As we walked into the Pound, Muriel and I were in tears. First was the cat section and then the doggies. We found a cute little black lab mix (again too hyper) and then there HE was in all his magnificence. He was a large purebred Siberian Husky. He had his nose up to the fence and just stared at me with those ice blue eyes. I was a little intimidated at first and asked the very nice attendants if he was friendly. They said, oh absolutely, so I asked if I could meet him outside in a little fenced area for viewing. He strutted outside with such pride and elegance, let me shake his paw, rolled over and I couldn't believe it. I thought there has to be something wrong with this dog. It was so hard to believe this guy was found roaming the streets. Who could lose such a magnificent dog? I kept on hemming and hawing to Muriel and still didn't want to do Sammy unjustly by adopting so soon after his death. Finally I said, is it all right if I go home and bring our little Goldie to meet him. They said fine, so off to home we went to get our little girl. Well, on leashes at the pound, it was love at first sight; quite unusual for Goldie. Not the slightest of grrrr's like she has done at other greetings. She thought he was a hunk of burning love so we took both of them to the play area to see how they would interact. NO PROBLEM!! Well, I still didn't know what to do and called my husband. He said well, 3 years is a little old (Sam was about 4 when we rescued him) and he had some considerations. I said but honey, you will love this guy. Hubby grew up with a husky / wolf mix, so I had a feeling anyway. After Sammy died, the next morning at 3:00 AM, Sam woke me up telling me how happy he was in doggie heaven; there was this mockingbird on the antenna next door that we could hear from our bathroom. This never happened so early in the morning! Also, everywhere I went there were beautiful butterflies and I interpreted them to be my beloved Sam telling me Mommy, it's all right and I know you need to have another dog in your life. My question was but when? I had no answer, but did share the stories with my girlfriend Sue and of course Muriel. Well, I'll be darned if a beautiful butterfly didn't fly right over this big boy's head to tell me it was OK to get him. It was like Sam saying it's OK Mommy, I love you so much and I want you to live your life through him and I will be in your heart forever. That was the time that I told Muriel that I am taking him home and we both cried. Our dear friends Pat and Sue met us at home and they just loved him. They have a husky / Shepard mix and are familiar with the breed. They said he was beautiful and feel in love like everyone else.

What a sight when my husband came home. They both eyed each other for a split second and darn near mad-dashed into a hug. There was licking, and rolling over, and cute sounds (really out of both of them). Hubby is in love. Hubby and "Scout" now take walks (well, really runs), play together, and have bonded. Scout, though, just can't leave me alone. He is by my side always. I believe he is so grateful for being rescued. When I look into Scout's eyes, I have found my "Sam" all over again. There is not a day that goes by that I do not feel my beloved Sam inside of Scout. Scout's mannerisms are so much like Sam's, that I have grown so easily in love this beautiful, magnificent animal. I feel so fortunate that there seems to be life after death, cause Sam is living it now through Scout. I have to say that he has been the best therapy my husband and I could have ever had. I love him so much. It is so comforting and he fills some of that hole in my heart from Sam. He of course does not replace him, but he is my new love and I cherish that. This miracle can happen to you.

I want to conclude my story by thanking the wonderful people at the San Martin Animal Shelter, and also our newfound friend from the Siberian Husky rescue / club (Jackie Porter). She gave us such great information on this new dog, and we are so grateful for the tips and insight. She also gave us the book Rainbow Bridge. I encourage you all to read this book if you have lost any loved animals. Thank you.

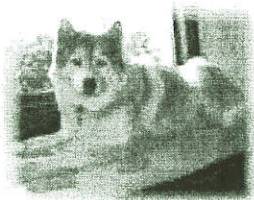

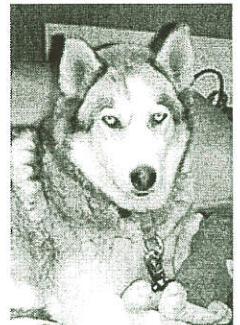
