Changing times.....

I wrote a little about this a few months ago, hoping that things would have changed by now with the pandemic allowing us more events etc. BASH Rescue has changed in the past few years as foster homes moved, life changed and our club membership has gone down, etc. It has changed a great deal in the past year. BASH only has 2-3 foster homes at any given time. There have been more dogs in need along with people that would like our help. There are also many people that are now working from home that want a Siberian as a companion. Many of these people don't mind a dog that is a little older. Heron Ho and I have created a system to help all without always using a BASH foster home.

The difference of a BASH foster home and someone helping us. Mostly it is how we can help financially through BASH. BASH can buy crates, kennels, dog food, treats, doggy gates, support the medical needs of dogs etc...for a foster home. Most of this is how the IRS looks at what we do. Any person fostering a dog through us – we can give them with items donated for rescues (food, toys, beds). We can help a person outside of BASH with ideas for medical support (there are a few groups that do this specifically) help them with behavioral issues.

What Heron and I do, is when we see a dog in need or are contacted (a few people have lost their homes or jobs and couldn't keep their Siberians) we discuss the dog and decide if we can help and how. Someone needs to rehome their Siberian....we tell them where to post (SHRRCA.com) as long as it is altered, help with the bio and Heron will screen adopters if they would like her to. A dog in a shelter, we get as much info as we can from staff (we aren't allowed to evaluate a dog personally at this time) Heron and I talked if the dog is adoptable and then Heron looks for someone that could foster. She has a wonderful network of people that will foster. If all looks good, we make arrangements for the person to pick up the dog, we supply them with collar, leash, dog food etc, and our support. Heron or I are available to help with behavior issues, medical etc. I get all the contacts from people interested and forward them to Heron to ask more questions and decide if the dog and family might be a match. If it seems they could be a meeting is arranged. We have also had a few BASH dogs that had to come back and the previous foster home was not available to take the dogs back, so Heron helped find a place for the dog. A few times it has been a boarding/day care and others a foster home.

There are more that help with different aspect and it is all GREATLY appreciated. We use everyone we can. We network, use social media and much more, and we have been able to rehome many Siberians. We post all Siberians in local shelters also...

A big Thank you to Heron for wanting to and being willing to help so many Siberians.

Peanut Butter Dog Treats

Ingredients

- 1 cup oats
- 1 egg
- 1 over-ripe banana

3 tablespoons peanut butter

Instructions

1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees.
2. Mash all the ingredients until well combined.
3. Scoop onto a rounded tablespoon onto a cookie sheet. slightly with a fork.
4. Bake for 10-12 minutes.
5. Cool fully before serving to your dog.

Notes

Once cooled, these homemade dog treats can be stored in an airtight container for 3 days at room temperature and for a week in the refrigerator.

Safe for humans as well.
